
The pungent odor of burning leaves is in the air as we trip briskly about the town in search of a col-



That Coplay's sleeves are rolled up has been well evidenced by the Salvage Committee since they first organized on March 12, 1942. Beginning their drive with a modest goal of 5 tons the committee wound up 1942 with over 115 tons of iron, steel, tin, paper, rags and tin cans and over \$1,200 turned over to the Coplay Defense Council.

Holidays, Sundays and evenings after their regular work were the favorite "working days" of the scrappers. The entire town caught the spirit of the tireless drive of this committee and as a result Coplay now leads the nation in communities its size for non-industrial Scrap Collection.

Beginning with January 1, 1943 the Committee established its own treasury and in early June purchased a 4-ton truck, licensed it and had it fully insured from the proceeds of its collections. Tonnage this year which of course will include the "old iron bridge" salvaged by a private dealer through the cooperation of town Council

and the Defense Council bids fair to excel last years record by many tons.

Among the projects already completed by the committee are an old iron bridge long abandoned as well as strips of abandoned rail sidings. The above pictures show the "gang" on the job in a desolate 150 ft. deep quarry hauling tons of "bundles for Berlin" with a power winch. A large number of men and women from town have helped at one time or another in collecting Coplay's gigantic pile of scrap and three of the number are being recommended for awards for over 500 hours of service in the year and a half of the "Scrappers" existence; they are Stanley Peters, Sr., "Jack" Gleason and Henry Battenfield. The general chairman of the committee is George J. Miller, the treasurer is Stanley Peters and the following are section heads: Heavy Iron and Steel, John P. Gleason; Paper and Rags, Henry Battenfield; and Tin Cans, Richard Brader. The tin can collection has now been taken up by the Coplay schools with equally successful results.


