The Air Raid Warden Sector, composed of Coplay and Stiles, wos organized in the Fall of 1941, with Dr. Weres as the first Sector Warden. In July, 1942, Dr. Weres was called to the Service of his country, and Arthur Miller was then appointed Sector Warden.




Announcement


The two Philadelphia teams also are surprising, until a week ago both were up with the leaders. After the Cubs won their first game they lost page eight



The two local boys swapped stories and news of interest that each had received from home as they reminisced on happenings and friends back in Coplay.




when one gets familiar with it. I can't, however, could you?



Coplay Soldier Member of 'Red Raiders,' U.S. Army Anzio Volunteers

With the Fifth Army, Italy-The Fifth Army's newest baby is an infantry patrol called the Red Raiders, which has already engineered several successful night raids on the Allied Fifth Army's Anzio beachhead in Italy.

Composed of experienced frontline riflemen, the patrol is a volunteer organization. 11 members received special training in use of weapons, hand-to-hand combat and scouting and patroling.

Carrying a Browning automatic rifle in the Red Raiders is Private Milton M. einer, son of Mrs. Helen Zeiner of 50 North Second Street, Coplay, Penna.

According to Private Zeiner,, results of the first six raids include capture of seven Germans, death of five others, and obliteration of a rifle grenade position, a machinegun nest and an outpost.


The patrol suffered no casualties in these exploits.

On a raid mission, Zeiner declared, the men black their faces to avoid detection in the light of flares and wear no helmets. Helmetless forays into enemy territory are risky business, but Zeiner and the members of the patrol talked it over and decided steel hats are too bulky in fast action.

The training The unit is broken down into three small, separate groups. program aims to make each man a self-sufficient fighting unit.

Private Zeiner has been overseas since February, 1943. He was stationed in North Africa before being transferred to Italy to head his group of volunteers. He will complete two years of Army service June 12.
