




Country" beyond all doubts. (Am fully taking into consideration that these countries have been shelled, bombed and over-run.)

Dear Staff:

I received another issue of the Ecohes and could not wait to receive it. I am in good health, and hope that your the same. Navy personnel allows us to give this information away — I have crossed the equator somewhere (censored) and have been initiated into the mysteries of the deep in keeping with the traditions of my realm, and I have been acclmaided a true and loyal son of Neptune.

I will give you some idea of my experience of the initiation. There is a certain clique of people aboard our ship called "shellbacks." The weather here isn't so hot. It rains pretty larn often and one gets tired of it, but, I hope to be home in the near future. I'll close now. So-longfi for now.



I had a grand time there and think it's the prettiest city I've yet seen. I spent a day trying to look up Tabby (was in Continental Headquarters but I didn't get to see him). Must say so-long for now. Best wishes to all!
