whan he come to age he made
hym a monke at Wynchestre.
Constanunce her fader was
slayn thorough treason. for it bi
fel vpon a tyrie that a peight
come to hym upon a day in
message as it were. i seide that
he wold speke with the kyng
priveliche in counseil. the kyng
sete vnde his chambre of the
men that were theryme. and
abide there no mo but the kyng
a the nighthe. and the peight

kepers of his body as he wolle we
ende thorowgh the lande to ordyn
ne thinges that perteyned to a kyng.
And this Dortexier honourede so
muche tho. C. knyghtes. and somo
the raf hem of golde & siluer & so
riche ieweles robes hors & othere
noblyce plente. Wherfore they he
elde hym more lord than they
diden the kyng. **T**hus Dortexier
tolde hem rif that he myghte be
kyng. he wolle make hem richesse
of the lande. So at the laste thorowgh
grete riftes that he hadde pouen
largely. they crieren thorowghout
the counte that Dortexier were bet
ter worthy to be kyng than Con
stancie. Wherfore Dortexier made
semblant as he hadde be wroth.
& departede themes fro the counte
and seide y hemust gone elles
Whider for thing that he hadde to
done. and so the traytour seide for
enchesoun that they shulde sseen
the kyng Constancie. **W**han
this Dortexier was gone it bisel
soone after that tho hundred
knyghtes of y eightes braken
the dores of the kinges chambre
and there they slowe the kyng.
and snyten of his heed & baren
it to Dortexier there y he dwelle
de. And whan Dortexier saugh
the heed. he wepte ful tenderly
with his eyen. and uatholes he
was somdel gladd of his deth. and

xxxvij. a. lyj. Engistes. and w
muche sorwe man of hem esca-
pere. And Vortiger hym self
was taken i laude to Thibong
castell. a putt into pson. and
some of Engistes men wolde
y' pe kyng hadde he brende al
quyk. **A**nd Vortiger tho to
haue his lyf graunte hem as
muche as they wolde aske. and
zaf up al the lande townes &
castelles Citees i Bourghes.
to Engist a to his folke. a also
the Britons flesode themmes.
into wales. and he helde hem
stille. And Engist wenie tho
rough the lande a seisede al ye
lande with sfranchises. and
in euy place lete caste don chur-
ches & houses of religion. a de-
strelle cristendome thorough
al the lande. a lete chaunge ye
name of the lande. y' noman
of his were so hardy after y'
tyme to casse this londe Bri-
taine. but to casse it Engis-
tes lande. and he departed
al the lande to his men. a ye
made. vñ. kynges for to streg-
ghise neyne comen therymie.
Regnum a principale.

As he firste kyngdome was
cert there y' Engist hym self
regnde. was lede a ouer
al the oþre. **N**another kyng
hadde Southsex. whiche is noþe

herde telle that Engist was come
az'en with a grete power into ys
lande: he assembled his Britons
and wente agyn Engist for to
haue zonen hym batayle & his
folke. But Engist dradde hym
sore of the Britons. for they had
be stonfited hym biforne hande
& dryuen hym out with strengthe.
Wherfore Engist praeide of a lo
ne day. and seide that he was not
comen into the lande for to fighte:
But to haue his lande agyn of
Kent if he myghte accord with
the Britons. & of hem haue gte.

The kyng Vortiger thorowgh
comisele of his Britons graun
tede a lone day. and thus it was
ordeyned thorowgh the Britons
þ' the same lone day shulde be hol
den faste bisides salisbury upon
an hille. and Engist shulde come
thidre with. m. knyghtes with
outen me. and the kyng with as
manye of the wiste of this lan
de. **T**hen at that day the kyng
come with his comisele as it was
ordeyned. But Engist hadde
warmed his knyghtes þmely and
hem comanded. þ' eueriche of
hem shulde putte a longe knyf in
his hose. and whan he seide faire
sires now is tyme to speken of so
de & pees. eynyche of hem anoen
shulde drawe his knyf & sle a
Briton. and so they quelled

this Edward in his childehode lo-

Gau the Erle Godewyn
that was dwellinge in
Denmark hadde mo-
che herde of the goodnesse of Ed-
ward i p^t he was of myt and of pi-
tee i thoughte p^t he wold be gone
azen into Engelonde for to seche
and for to haue gte of hym i that
he myghte haue his loude azen
in pees. and arrayede hym as mo-
che as he myghte i putte hym to
ward the see i come into Eng-
elonde to london there y^t he bring
was y^t tyme i alle the lordes of
Engelonde i heeld a grete par-

for to makyn hym byng. and so
they wenten in her way towarde
london. And whan they comen
vpon Gyldeston. tho seide the
traytour Godewyne to Alured
Edbeth heede qd he aboute you

And now for soþe quod alured
