... Wheels Were Set In Motion To Raise Funds For A New Student Health Center on Campus

A challenge gift of \$250,000 has been offered by an anonymous donor to build, equip and endow a new student health center if the University will raise a like amount for this purpose.

The committee on annual giving under Stewart J. Cort, chairman, will attempt to raise a substantial part of the amount necessary to meet the

challenge by exceeding their \$202,000 total last year, and will seek the balance from the parents' committee and other friends of the University.

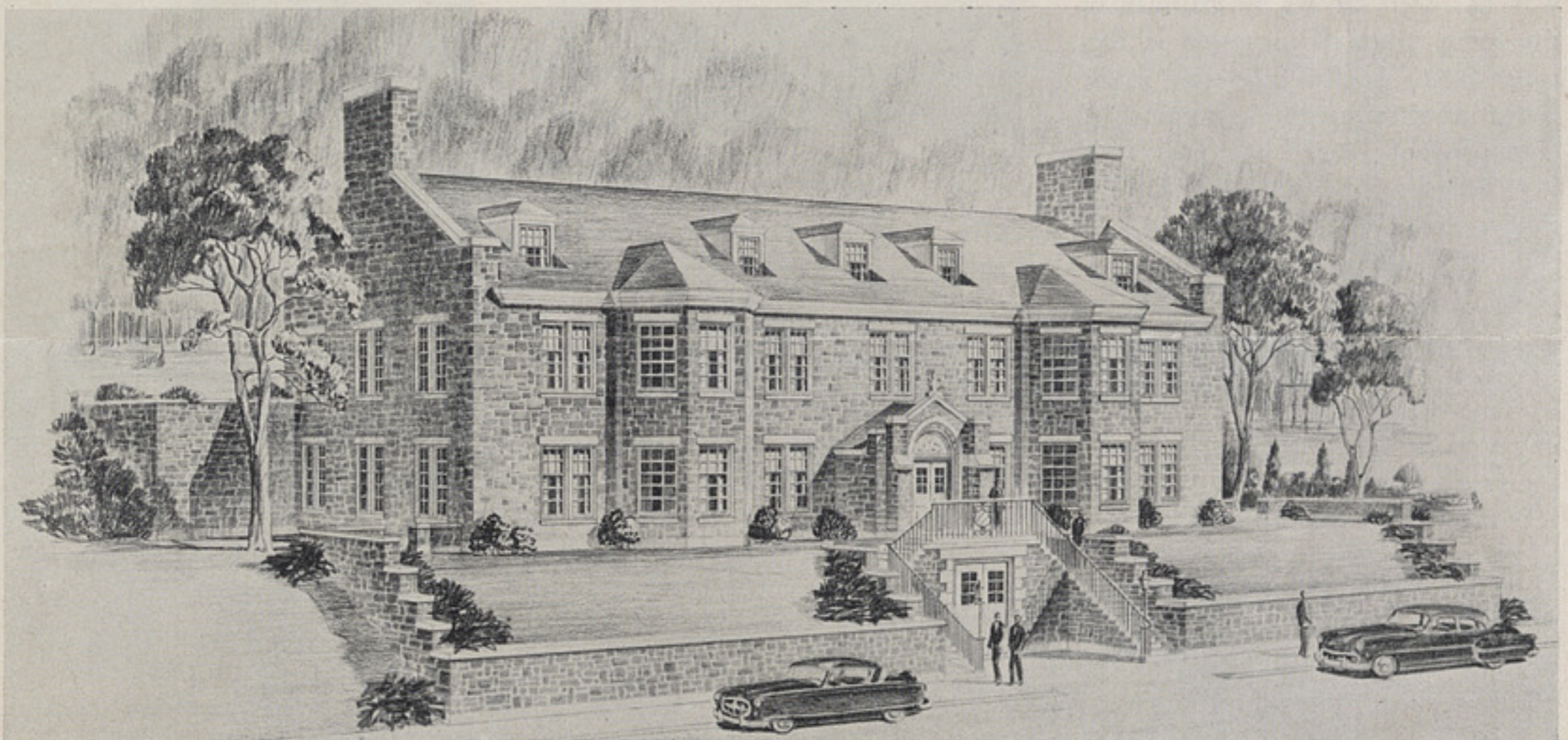
The new building, 41 by 98 feet, will replace the wooden frame structure acquired as war surplus in 1946.

The main floor will contain the dispensary, six observation rooms, and X-ray, audio, sterilizing and sinus

treating rooms.

The ground floor will have an entrance from a lower level and will include two waiting rooms, examining room, physio-therapy section, ultra-violet ray room and administrative offices.

The basement will provide space for mechanical equipment, record storage and files, infirmary and garage.



When built, the new Student Health Center will be conveniently located diagonally across the road from Taylor House.

Are You Eligible For One Of The Professional Degrees

If more alumni who hold degrees in engineering were aware of the opportunity to earn professional degrees, it is probable that more would undertake to qualify for these awards.

A graduate of Lehigh with the B. S. degree in one of the branches of engineering may be a candidate for the corresponding professional degree—C.E., M.E., E.E., Met.E., E.M., Ch.E. and I.E. To qualify for a professional degree, a candidate must submit evidence of having had, since graduation, at least five years of acceptable

experience in the field of engineering corresponding to the degree desired, and must submit also an acceptable thesis, the subject of which must be approved in advance by the Committee on Professional Degrees.

Professional degrees are conferred only in June. Detailed information on requirements and application forms may be obtained from *The Registrar, Lehigh University.*

Renovation Of Taylor Stadium Nears Finish

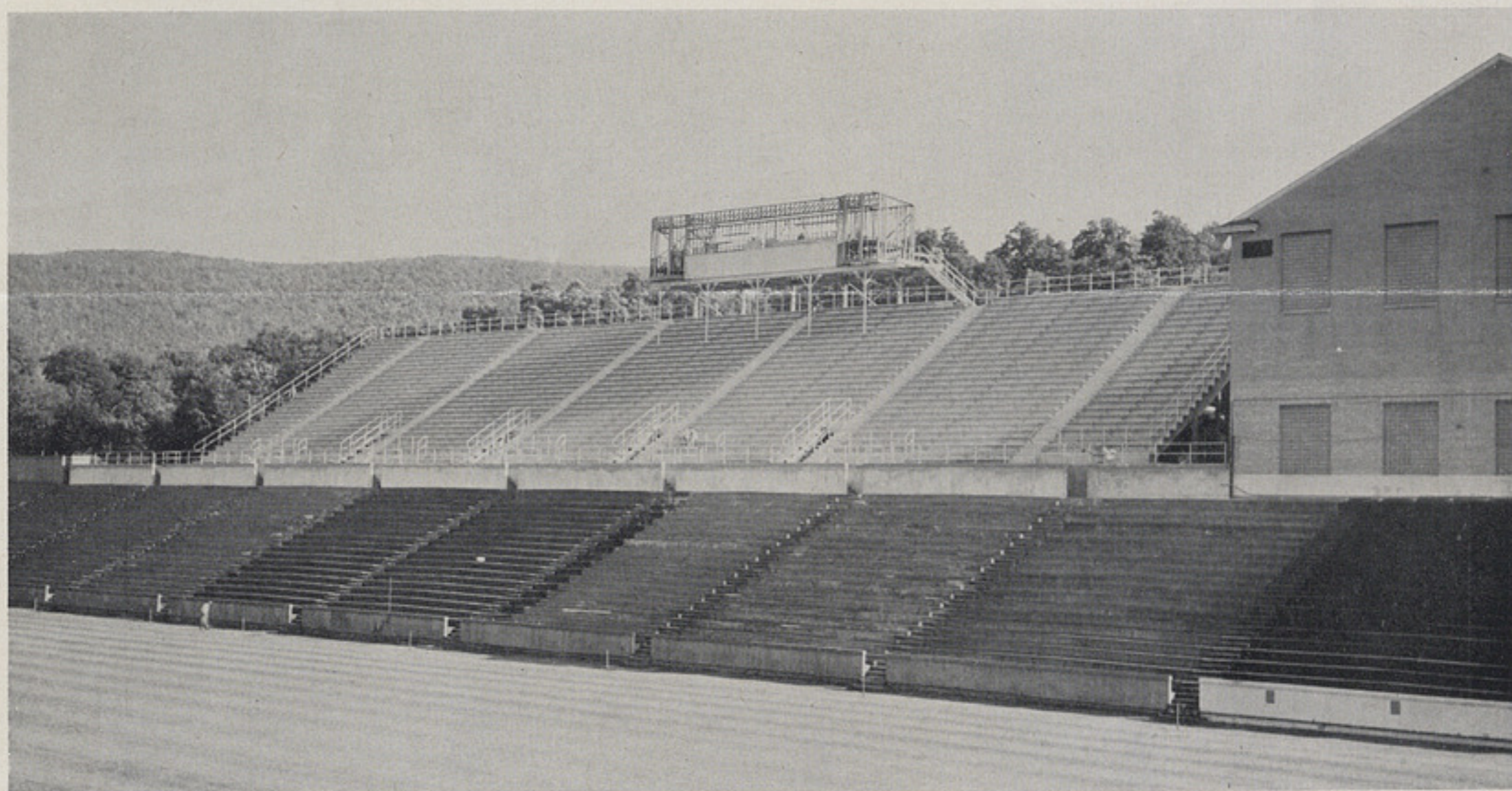
New steel stands have been erected on the south side of Taylor Stadium which will increase the seating capacity by approximately 4,000. This is the first major work done on the Stadium since it was constructed 39 years ago.

Work is in progress on the new press box which will include separate booths for radio and television crews covering home contests.

Other new facilities now under way are new men's and women's lavatories on the south side and a renovation of existing washrooms on the north side of the stadium.

The new stands have been erected 26 rows high and the gridiron will be moved 12 yards to the east, thereby making available another section of seats unused in past campaigns.

Plans are also being studied for the improvement of the concrete stands as well as adding temporary bleachers on the north side of the stadium.

Byron Inc. Establishes Engineering Scholarships

Two new scholarships have been established through a gift of \$2500 from Byron Inc., Washington, D. C. motion picture studios and laboratory.

The awards, given in recognition of the need of the motion picture industry for trained engineers, are part of a long-range program of the Society of Motion Picture and Television Engineers for the encouragement of industry-wide training. With the scholarships go a student membership in the Society which will include the monthly journal.

Simultaneously Dr. Wray H. Congdon, chairman of the committee on scholarships at Lehigh announced that the first two Byron Scholarships which start with the current fall semester, have been awarded to James G. Gottling, Baltimore, Md., who is starting his final year of a five-year engineering program, and Ted A. Dolotta, Vineland, N. J., junior in engineering physics.

The selections are made by the university scholarship committee on the basis of character, personality, high scholastic achievement and financial need. The scholarships go to one junior and one senior majoring in

the fields of engineering pertinent to the technical training required by the motion picture industry. Preference is given to students enrolled in chemistry, chemical engineering, mechanical engineering, and engineering physics.

Byron S. Roudabush, owner of Byron, Inc., attended Lehigh University in the Fall of 1925 before leaving to enter the American Academy of Dramatic Arts in New York from which he was graduated.

87th Academic Year Opens With 708 In Frosh Class

Freshman Week ended on September 23 for 708 new students as the University's 87th academic year started.

The class of 1957 is made up of 68 students in the College of Arts and Science, 109 in the College of Business Administration and 531 in the College of Engineering. Another group of 33 war veterans registered September 21 when upperclassmen returned to the campus.
